Removing the ministry pedestal

I have been reflecting upon our early days of missionary service as Debbie and I contemplate our vocational retirement at the end of this year. I still remember when we first went to the field, a well-meaning elderly widow in our church told us that we were her heroes for sacrificing so much to go to a "foreign land." I honestly did not know what to make of that — I certainly did not feel like a hero, rather more like a very young and scared follower of Jesus with little to offer but myself in my call to follow Him wherever he would take us.



Global workers can inadvertently be put upon a pedestal by those who send them. And, yes, it still happens in our current day. (See an article in The Gospel Coalition, <u>6 Ways to Love Your Missionaries When They Come Home</u>—#1 issue was Beware of Missionary Hero Worship.) Even though I myself often tell global workers how great they are for doing what they do (and I do believe it!), problems arise on both sides when this message gets carried too far. Unintentional damage can be done to both the senders and the goers.

On the sender side, people think: "Global workers are not like me; they are superhuman. I could never do what they do." But on the missionary goers' side, they think: "A lot is at stake: I need to be superhuman, so I shouldn't be honest about my struggles." In truth, senders are just trying to acknowledge and honor the very real sacrifices that cross-cultural workers face. But the pressure missionaries feel to keep trying to be worthy of the money, effort, and prayer invested is real.

When senders say, "You are superhuman" and the goers say, "We need to live up to those extrodinary expectations" it can be calamitous to individuals, families, and organizations and to the Gospel itself.

Yes, we recognize that missions is a superhuman, God-sized task, but God uses everyday people just like you and me. That is why we emphasize the need to pray, pray, pray and support those working cross-culturally. We all have access to the same Spirit filled power to live into the life and calling that He gives each one of us.

And we do ourselves no favor either, for who knows, God may one day call us, whatever our station is in life now, to cross-cultural ministry – whether here at home or abroad. And God delights in using humble and available people just like you and like me.




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
