A STORY FROM SOUTH ASIA

Honoring God, blessing others

It was almost 13 years ago in South Asia when Dinesh's* family was devastated by the sudden death of their youngest child from an AIDS related illness. Amidst the grief, Dinesh, his parents and his older brother were told to take an HIV test. His father and older brother tested negative, but Dinesh and his mother were both informed they were HIV positive.

At the time, Dinesh wasn't aware of the effects of HIV, but he obediently took the recommended treatment twice a day as instructed. Dinesh continued with his schooling, but as he learnt more about HIV from a Catalytic team, he started to better understand what his treatment was for — and he was full of questions. In answer to Dinesh's worries, the Catalytic team provided invaluable support and council, walking alongside Dinesh, and helping him confront his fear, confusion and questions. They offered him their time, their testimonies and their care.

Instead of complaining about his lot in life, Dinesh instead considered others who would suffer like him: "What could I do to help them?" was often his question. Having seen the impact that the Catalytic team had had on his life, Dinesh recently decided to join them after he finishes his education.

His aim is to honor God through his efforts, blessing others through his service: "If I am worthy, I will try and lead this ministry. I may be weak physically, but I am strong in Christ," he declares, confident that God can use him in the future to bring hope to so many others, who like himself, desperately need it.

intensive program for people working with the
vulnerable, marginalized or those affected by
HIV and AIDS. Participants are challenged in
their thinking, come away with changed
perceptions, gain the skills to present
Channels of Hope workshops themselves and
have the ability to make a real difference in
the HIV and AIDS pandemic.

COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAMMES

Teams reach out to local communities, showing the compassion of Christ to people living with, or vulnerable to, HIV. Programs vary from place to place but often include HIV prevention sessions in schools and prisons, workshops in churches to raise awareness, mentoring vulnerable children and youth, partnerships with local healthcare services and support for individuals living with HIV.
